



Evolving unique design patterns from the lives and times of the Ghosals — an unlearning to learn a new approach

The open-plan kitchen is seen beyond he process of designing is invoking, self cleansing and rewarding in many ways—is what we learned while conceiving the duplex apartment for Sabari and Probal Ghosal. In between the innumerable dinners and lunches hosted by the gracious couple, we managed to find time to create a comfortable, warm house. It was designed from the references and relationships formed in their lives. A family of four, their cosy five bedroom apartment could accommodate a whole lot. The brief was to identify and relate to that very warmth and their journey through times, textures and space.

We started the process with an informal discussion of their lives so far – individual love for books, food, saris, wood, lamps and so on. The biggest challenge lay in re-planning and converting the flat into a more customised, fluid space that was not divided into many rooms. We began by transforming one of the extra bedrooms at the entrance into a lounge connected with the living area. The attached toilet was reduced to a powder room and the freed up space in between became an open bar.

A completely boxed in kitchen was opened up and the floor of the adjoining dining space raised using a polished sheesham wood platform to create an interface between the guests and hosts who love entertaining. The staircase was transformed from being a connecter into a transitional library with a morning lounge at the lower level and a study at the top, joined by a string of bookshelves to house the owners' prized collections.

In our series of experiments with space and materials, we used old saris, froze them in transparent epoxy tablets and placed them at the entrance. A wall of wicker (woven on site by craftsmen from Kolkata) with large copper reflectors became a huge lampshade to bathe the living room with a mystic light during the evenings. To continue the trials on textures, other elements like a honeydew onyx bar counter, sheesham rafters and acid treated copper table tops were incorporated.

The experience of designing for the Ghosals was exhilarating, giving us a new and deeper clarity towards creating a house....

Its not what we designers wish to design, but what the clients carefully choose and pick, elements from their memories and hand over to us to evolve a pattern that is so unique, maswellous and dissolves all design theories. Then what we learn in years is unlearned and we start afresh into a process called...non-designing.



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
